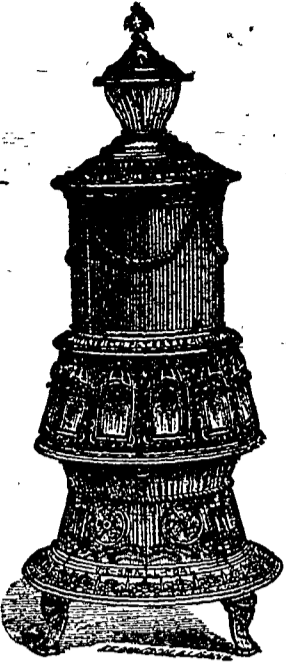


**CELEBRATED BASE BURNING STOVE
