The No. 2 Machine, fully represented in the above cut, is particularly adapted to the tarmer's use; in intended to apply to any common lever or railway power; weighs 1,300 pounds; has an iron threshers frame, and cylinder, 122 inches in diameter and 28 inches long; delivers the clean grain in bags, or if frame, and cylinder, 12½ inches in diameter and 28 inches long; delivers the clean grain in bags, or if desired, in a half bushel. 


