DEATH OF SENATOR FESSENDEN .- Hon. Wm. Pitt Fossenden, United States Sonator from Maine, who had for some days being lying dangerously ill at his home in Portland, Maine, died shout half past 6 o'clock last Wednesday morning a week, aged 63 years. The story of the Avondale disaster is made a little less hideous than was at first supposed, by the discovery that instead of two hundred and three men but one hundred and eight were imprisoned and suffered a horrible death in the burning collicry. The closing agony of the death of these men will never be known as the mine has been theroughly explored, and of all those who were below the ground when the awful catastrophe occurred, not one has survived to tell the secrets of their prison house. The researches through the galleries of the mine have shown that when the last hope of communication with the shaft was out off the men en deavoted to save their lives by erecting barriers to shut out the smoke and gas, but the effort failed. The use of the steam fan to drive fresh air down the shaft after the explosion, has been found to have been a fatal mistake, the smoke and gas being driven by it into all the passages of the mine and away from the shaft, its only method of escape.-In New York and elsewhere liberal subscriptions are being made for the relief of the widows and orphans of the dead, and a very large sum will undoubtedly be raised. The miners are reported as firm in their determination to refuse again to enter a mine withbut one shaft and no other means of essape. and their resolution ought to have the effect of compelling the necessary improvements in all the mices.

Cauelty to Animals.—The penalty for wantonly or cruelly ill-treating, or otherwise abusing any horse or other domestic animal, under the act passed by the Legislature, is a fine of not less than ten nor more than twenty dollars for the first offense, and not less than twenty and nor more than fifty dollate for the second and subsequent offenses, One half of the fine goes to the informant, and the other half to the county wherein the act was committed. In case of refusal to pay the fine and costs the offender is to be committed to the county prison, there to remain until discharged by due course of


