September 30, bave been repapitulated by the proper officers, and the fact is made clear and undeniable that for the first half year of General Grapt's administration. as compared, with the same period in 1868, the increase in the revenue and the decrease in the expenditure aggregate the enormous sum of fifty-six millions of dollars. The increase from customs has been \$3.191,000; and from internal revenue 16,468,000. The decrease in army expenses has been \$32,094,000, and in those of the pavy 61,845,000. The aggregate of the figures is \$56,000,000 and more.

Another fact is worth noting; the cost of collecting the internal revenue has been reduced \$799,000 for the last three months over that of last year-a saving of 161 per cent.
