BALTIMORE January 4, 1870.—BREAD-STUFFS.—We notice more activity in Flour this morning, sales being reported on Change of 2,000 bbls City Mills Extra for Rio at \$5.75, and to the local trade of 500 bbls. Howard Street Extra in lots at \$5.50 @ 5.75, and 500 bbls do. Family, also in lots, at \$5.25 to \$7 per bbl.

WHEAT.—The market was quiet this morning, and for Pennsylvania red prices were slightly off, 3,500 bushels prime selling at 123 @ 120 cts. There were no prime or choice samples Maryland red at market, but we notice sales of 1,000 bushels fair, do. at 125 @ 123 cts., and a small lot fair white at 133 cts., which comprises all the transactions reported.
