Counterfeit fifty cent notes of the new series are in circulation.

Gen. Franz Sigel has been appointed by the President Assessor of Internal Revenue for the Sixth District of New York.

The well-known editor of the Louisville Journal, Geo. D. Prentiss, died on Saturday last, in the 68th year of his age.

John D. Ott, Esq., a former editor and proprietor of the Hagerstown Mail, died at Woodstock, Va., on the 10th instant, in the 67th year of his age.

The exciting contest for the election of State Treasurer, in the Maryland Legislature, ended on the 19th inst. by the election of John Meryman over Robert Fowler, the present incumbent.

At Richmond, Va., on Monday, the City Council adopted resolutions expressing gratification at the prospect of the speedy admission of the State to representation in Congress, and requesting General Canby to fire a salute of one hundred guns in honor of the event.

The villains, Bohner and Van Bodenburgh who murdered the Peightal family near Huntingdon several months since, were last week tried, found guilty of murder in the first degree, and sentenced to be hung.

Ohio, Iowa and Rhode Island have ratified the Fifteenth Amendment making in all twenty-seven States. But one more is wanted, and that one will undoubtedly be Nebraska, whose legislature has been called by Governor Butler to meet in special session in the first week of February.

The United States Senate on Friday took up the Virginia bill, and several hours were occupied in a personal quarrel between Mr. Trumbull and Mr. Sumner.

The Peightal Murderers. The Huntingdon Journal of 19th inst., gives the following account of the preparations for the escape of the villains, Bohner and Bordenburgh, from the Huntingdon jail.

On Saturday afternoon a man named Foust, living somewhere near Altoona, who was here as a witness in the case, and who seemed to be on very intimate terms with the prisoners, called at the hardware store of Wharton & Maguire and asked for iron saws and English files.

EXAMINATION OF THE PRISONERS, finding upon their persons amongst other things two large knives ground very thin and sharp at the points, with hand-guards attached to the handles.
