Rye flour may be quoted at \$5.50. In corn meal there is nothing doing.

WHEAT.—The wheat market is firm for prime lots; sales of western red at \$1.35 @ 1.38, 1,800 bushels choice amber at \$1.40 @ 1.47, and 1,200 bushels Illinois and Kentucky white at \$1.50 @ 1.50. Rye may be quoted at \$8 @ 90 cents. Corn is quiet but steady; sales of 2500 bushels at \$1.02 for Pennsylvania yellow, 98 @ 98 1/2 cents for western do., and 94 @ 96 cents for western mixed. Oats are unchanged, sales of 5,000 bus. at 50 @ 53 cents for Pennsylvania and western.
