The number of lives lost by the flood in Virginia is estimated at one hundred.

While the Rev. Mr. Addison Jones, colored, was preaching in Staunton, Va, on Tuesday, he dropped dead in the pulpit.

Hon. Ed. McPherson, Clerk of the House of Representatives, is said to be in very bad health.

THE ELECTIONS.—The majority for the Republican State ticket in Ohio at the late election is said to foot up over 15,000.

The result in Indiana at last accounts was in doubt.

Hon. John C. Kunkel, of Harrisburg, died on the 4th inst., after a protracted illness he was widely known, and was distinguished as an eloquent orator, and as a lawyer.

Dr. W. H. Jones, a prominent physician of Cleveland, Ohio, was shot and in stantly killed Saturday, by Dr. Gallantine, for alleged seduction of the latter's wife.

Montana mountains are covered with snow.

Gen Robert E. Lee died at his residence in Lexington, Va, at half past 9 o'clock on Wednesday morning a week, of congestion of the brain, aged 63 years, 8 months and 23 days.

There is said to be in the Crawford and Venango oil region one man who enjoys an income of \$3,200 per day, and another whose income reaches the enormous sum of \$7,200 daily, or \$5 per minute.

THE WAR.—The New York World and the London Standard have advised that Bazaine has cut his way out of Metz, and his entire army is moving on Verdun and Thionville.

In London, however, the report is considered doubtful, and at the headquarters of King William it is said that an envoy from Bazaine is now on the way thither to treat for the surrender of Metz.

There are statements that the Prussians have been defeated and driven out of Orleans, a combined attack having been made upon their positions there by the army in that location and by a portion of the garrison of Paris, who made a sortie southward from the Capital, under the personal leadership of General Trochu.

Telegrams from French sources reiterate the previous reports: that the Prussians have been dislodged from many of their strongest positions around Paris by attacks made from the shelter of the fortification, the guns of which are so effectually worked as to prevent the besiegers from erecting batteries, but despatches from the Prussian headquarters at Versailles deny that the besieging forces have suffered any defeats.

Near Chantillon a large Prussian train was captured by the Franco-tireurs. In the same vicinity a heavy skirmish occurred on Thursday, the result being the entire defeat of the Prussians, although General Dampierre commanding the French forces, was killed. General Bunsick returned to Paris on Monday last, and it is believed that he is endeavoring to negotiate an armistice. In London it is thought that efforts for peace are actively in progress, and may be successful. The town of Souissons, seventy-four miles north-east of Paris, has been surrendered to the Prussians. General Sheridan expresses the opinion that the capitulation of Paris is only a matter of time. Garibaldi has been appointed to the command of the irregular forces in the Vosges Mountains.

President Grant has issued a proclamation of neutrality in the war between France and Prussia. It declares that the bays, waters and harbors of the U. States shall not be used in preparing for war by either party, that ships of war of either belligerent shall not leave a port of the United States within twenty-four hours after the departure of a merchantman of either belligerent, that war vessels of either belligerent shall not remain in any United States port more than twenty-four hours, unless it be for needed repairs or supplies, and that a war vessel of either party after once having entered United States port shall not re-enter a United States port until after having visited a European port of its own Government.

On Friday last Secretary Cox, of the Interior Department, tendered his resignation to the President, who, it is understood, has accepted it, to take effect when the annual report of the Department shall have been made, which will be in about thirty days.
