Four steamboats were burned on the same day at New Orleans, and the steamship De Soto, while passing down the Miss. issippi, was totally distroyed by fire,

Another despatch says that the palace of Malmaison, about four miles west of Paris, was set on fire and destroyed by the French guns of Mt.
