ROASTED ALIVE

The following record of one day's accidents, all on the same hour, viz: the use of inferior Coal Oil, is taken from the Philadelphia Ledger of a recent date:

"The alarm of fire, last evening, at 7 o'clock, was caused by the burning of the dwelling, corner of 16th and Poplar, resulting from the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Miss Herab, occupying the second story of the dwelling had retired to her apartment, leaving her room, and was found lying on the floor, wrapped in flames."

"About 7 o'clock yesterday evening, a coal oil lamp in the hands of Sarah Alexander, who lives on Cowpath St., near 15th. She was never lit burned."

"Margaret Colligan, residing in the rear of 619 South st. was burned by the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Her husband, while attempting to extinguish the flame, was also severely burned. Two of the above named victims have since died of their injuries."

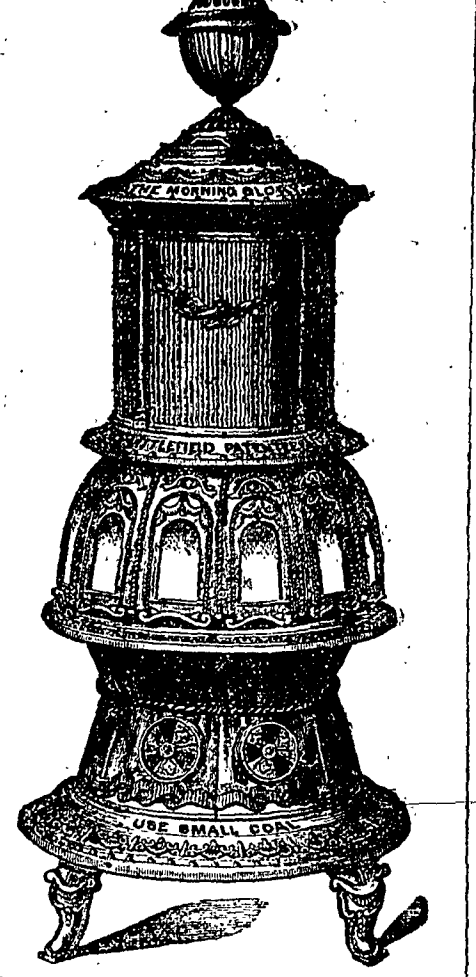
