ROASTED ALIVE

The following record of one day's accidents, all from the same cause, viz: the use of inferior Coal Oil, is taken from the Philadelphia Ledger of a recent date:

"The alarm of fire, last evening, at 7 o'clock, was caused by the burning of the dwelling, corner of 16th and Poplar, resulting from the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Mrs. Hersh, occupying the second story of the dwelling had retired to her apartment, a few moments before the discovery of the fire. On entering her room, she was found lying on the floor, wrapped in flames.

"About 7 o'clock yesterday morning, a coal oil lamp in the hands of Sarah Alexander, who lives on Cowlip St. near 16th. She was severely burned. Margaret Colligan, residing in the rear of 618 South st. was burned by the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Her husband, while attempting to extinguish the flames, was also severely burned. Two of the above named victims have since died of their injuries.

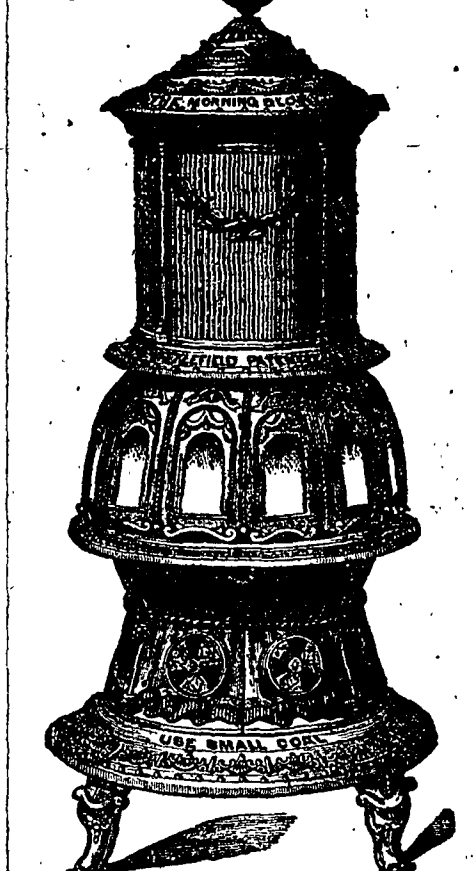
