REV. DR. HONSON, P. E., will preach in the Methodist Church, on Sunday (to-morrow) morning at 10 o'clock.

The Association meets every Saturday afternoon. We hope the Association will be well attended, not alone by those who are Teachers, but those who feel an interest in the schools, and those who intend to become teachers would profit by connecting themselves with the Association.
We spent a few days during last week, in the Quaker City, and made our home, for the time, at "The American Hotel," Chestnut street, which is, unquestionably, one of the finest hotels in that city. Its location is decidedly very desirable for the pleasure seeker or the business man; being in the very centre of the fashionable promenades and only within a few blocks of all the leading wholesale houses. In addition to this, its management is complete. Affable and obliging book keepers, attentive servants, well ventilated and good sized chambers, say nothing of the excellent larder, which cannot be excelled by any hotel in the "City of Brotherly Love."

We cannot see why "The American" is not more of a Lancaster county head quarters. Its fare is now reduced to one dollar and a half a day. We would say to our friends, try "The American."

As Col. Hambricht's Lancaster County Regiment was embarking at Pittsburg, on Friday afternoon of last week, an accident occurred in consequence of an unmanageable artillery horse, which they were putting on board the steambot, jumping overboard and was killed; the excitement bringing all on board, to the fore end of the boat, and crushing in the hurricane deck. The scene is described as having struck terror to all within sight.

Col. Hambricht and Lieut. Col. J. H. Duchman on the boiler deck, the former, miraculously it would seem, escaped entirely, but the latter received an injury to his neck, from which he suffered considerable inconvenience. The Adjutant Charles R. Frailey, was also on the boiler deck, and was most seriously injured. At five o'clock he was in an insensible state, from concussion of the brain. He was observed standing upright, under the broken deck, immediately after the accident, but was soon overcome from the effect of the heavy weight suddenly coming upon his head.

The band of the regiment were collected immediately in front on the hurricane deck, and when the crash came were the first to fall forward. Daniel Clemens, and several others were severely, but not dangerously injured. Mr. Frailey was taken to the residence of G. Washington Smith, formerly a Lancasterian, of the firm of Hostetter & Smith, and at last accounts was expected to join the Regiment in a few days.

The 45th Regiment, P. V. under Col. Thomas Welsh, left Camp Curtin on Monday last. Previous to their departure Col. Curtin presented a stand of colors. Col. Welsh, in reply to the presentation speech of the Governor, said "the flag should never be disgraced so long as a strong arm in his regiment was left to uphold it." The Colonel is a Columbian, and Lancaster County may well be proud of him. Our old friend and townsman, Captain John McClure, is attached to this regiment as Quartermaster, and will, beyond doubt, make an obliging officer.

The continued rains keep the Susquehanna very high; for the past week quite a number of board and timber rafts arrived and passed on eastward, giving employment to a number of our hardy watermen. These Fall freshets are quite a God-send in many respects.
Our townsman, Harry Wolfe, has gone into the Wheat/Coffee manufacture; this beverage has become very popular in our neighborhood and Harry will make it right. He sells it at Ten cents a pound.

The annual election for officers of the "Marietta and Lancaster;" the "Marietta and Mount Joy;" and the "Marietta and Maytown" turnpike road companies takes place on Monday next.

The Relief Committee was appointed by the Burgess and Town Council, acting for the citizens, by request made in Town Meeting in April last. It was organized as follows, on the 23d of April: Capt. Grosh, Secretary; James Wilson, Esq., Treasurer; Miss Bailie and Mrs. Clark, visitors for the first ward, west of Gay street, embracing fifteen families; Mrs. Moore and Mrs. Hinkle, for second ward, between Gay and Walnut streets, six families; Misses Cassel and Hopkins, for third ward, between Walnut and Bank streets, six families; Mrs. Engle and Mrs. Croust, for fourth ward, seven families, between Bank street and Chickies.

The subscriptions of the third and fourth wards were combined by the Committee. In the first ward there were a number of subscriptions made, on which there were no payments made, which is the cause of the amount unpaid being almost four times as large as that of either of the other wards. The refunding account in the expenditures is a distribution of Twenty-five per cent. to all subscribers of five dollars or upwards, who have paid in full, for the purpose of bringing them nearer to an equality with those who have paid only a part. The balance on hand is to be retained during the war to meet any claims of needy volunteers or their families, who may be deemed entitled by the Town Council.

Having investigated the accounts, and found them not only correct but also kept in a most satisfactory and business-like manner, we would here express our thanks to the Relief Committee for the noble devotion they have manifested for our Country's cause, by attending with the greatest promptness and regularity to the wants of our Soldiers families.
