

George B. McClellan was born n Philadelphia on the 3d of December, 1826, his father being an eminent physician of that city. At the age of sixteen, or in 1842, he entered the West Point Academy, and in 1846, at the age of twenty, was graduated second in his class. On the 1st of July of that year he was brevetted second lieutenant of engineers. By an act of Congress passed during the May previous, a company of sappers, miners, and pontoniers was added to the engineer corps, and in this compary Mc-Clellan was commissioned.

The question of General McClellan's successor in the command of the army of the Potomac is already under discussion. General Halleck, now in Washington city, is most talked of. For the present, however, atleast, he will give, as heretofore, hisparticular attention to the army of the Potomac.
