The power of drafting, and provisions for its use, are duly provided for in the legislation of the United States. An old law, passed in 1792, entitled "An act for the National defence, by establishing a uniform militia throughout the United States," and afterward amended and applied to all arms-bearing citizens of the country, gives the President authority to order a draft. The enactment immediately bearing on the subject, however, is that made by the last Congress, and passed July 16, 1862. The first section of that bill provides as fol-

"That whenever the President of the United States shall call forth the militia of the States, to be employed in the service of the United States, he may specify in his call the period for which such service will be required, not exceeding nine months; and the militia so called shall be mustered in and continue to serve for and during the term so speciknow it."
