An order has been issued in Iowa to draft all persons who in any way discourage enlistments. This is an excellent idea and we hope the example thus set will be speedily followed in this and other States. We know a few characters—none of the best—in this place who, were such an order in operation, would either keep the foul mouths closed or be compelled to shoulder a musket and thus do something towards redeeming their constant boasts that they are as "good Union men" as anybody. Let the Iowa idea be promulgated in our midst. We learn from a couple of members of our collecting committee that when they called on Dr. E. Haldeman, the Buchanan postmaster at Chikis, for a contribution toward the bounty fund, that he refused to contribute a dime, saying to the committee men: "the Southern Confederacy is a fixed fact, and you know it." He however, declared himself a "Union man and Democrat," whereupon one of the committee said he had "a d—d strange way of showing it." The Doctor made a long-winded defence of his questioned loyalty at the commencement of hostilities, through the columns of the Lancaster Express, but we think he did not even then make a clean breast of it. He will have to try again.

In consequence of the absence of E. D. Roach, Esq., at war, and captain of a volunteer company in the 107th Pennsylvania Regiment, his place in the school board was filled on Monday evening last by the appointment of Mr. Jonathan M. Larzaleze. Mr. L. was a member of the board last year and was always regarded as an efficient and useful member. The schools have been allotted as follows:

A very large and enthusiastic war meeting was held in Centre Square, Lancaster, on Saturday last. The venerable Dr. F. A. Mullenberg presided, assisted by a long list of vice presidents and secretaries. Speeches were made by Col. John W. Forney, Merton McMichael, of the Philadelphia North American, Rev. Alfred Cookman, Prof. Schaff, Rev. F. W. Courad, and O. J. Dickey. The city presented a gay appearance—flags flying in every direction and drums and fifes playing. A band stationed in the square—recreating going on all the time. The tents in the square were the amongst the most attractive places of the day.

The best seat sometime since by the "Marietta Patriotic Circle" to the Hospital at York, Pa., is this handsomely acknowledged:

York, July 21, 1862. Mrs. S. P. Sterrett: It gives me pleasure to acknowledge the receipt of a box of Hospital Supplies from your association. It has been taken in charge by the Ladies of the Society, and some of the articles have already gone to promote the comfort of the suffering soldiers, while the remainder will be distributed at an early day, as their necessities may require. Everything sent was acceptable and useful, and permit me to thank you for your Society, and in behalf of the sick and wounded soldiers, for your kind co-operation with us.

With Much Respect, L. DASHER. One of the most deserved promotions of the Pennsylvania Railroad company is that of Mr. Butler, who, for a short time, filled Mr. Hambricht's place on the Lancaster train. We are sorry to learn that he has been transferred to the Parkburg train, for he had already made a host of friends on this route, and would soon have been placed by the side of Reese and Unger—long since acknowledged the most obliging conductors on this road—for his courteous and attentive demeanor toward passengers.

Mr. Geist will open his school again on Monday next. This step has been taken at the instance of a number of parents, who wish their children to be as forward as possible by the regular commencement of the next high school session; the price, too—a mere pittance—only 75 cents. This is a wise step—too much recreation will beget indolence; a little play—then work—a little play again will accomplish much.

As Mr. John M. Whitebill, of this place, was entering the cars at Lancaster on Saturday evening last, his pocket book was taken from him by a villain; fortunately the book contained but a couple dollars in money, but a number of notes, payment on which have been stopped.

DRAFTING.—From present appearances a draft will have to be resorted to to fill up the second call of the President for 300,000 more soldiers. From calculations made by "knowing ones," Lancaster county's proportion will be about one out of every fifteen, so the chances of being drafted are certainly very slim.

The power of drafting, and provisions for its use, are duly provided for in the legislation of the United States. An old law, passed in 1792, entitled "An act for the National defence, by establishing a uniform militia throughout the United States," and afterward amended and applied to all arms-bearing citizens of the country, gives the President authority to order a draft. The enactment immediately bearing on the subject, however, is that made by the last Congress, and passed July 16, 1862. The first section of that bill provides as follows:

"That whenever the President of the United States shall call forth the militia of the United States, he may specify in his call the period for which such service will be required, not exceeding nine months; and the militia so called shall be mustered in and continue to serve for and during the term so specified unless sooner discharged by command of the President. If by reason of defects in existing laws, or in the execution of them in the several States, or any of them, it shall be found necessary to provide for enrolling the militia and otherwise putting this act into execution, the President is authorized in such cases to make all necessary rules and regulations; and all the enrollment of the militia shall in all cases include all able-bodied male citizens between the ages of eighteen and forty-five, and shall be apportioned among the States according to representative population."

A very large meeting was held in the Town Hall Park on Wednesday evening, for the purpose of filling up the ranks of Capt. Samuel G. Miller's company. Rev. A. B. Grosh was called to the chair; he made a beautiful and very affecting appeal on taking the chair; Isaac S. Geist was appointed secretary, when Rev. Alfred Cookman was introduced, who made a thrilling address, followed by R. W. Shenk, Rev. J. B. Mattocks, Capt. Byerly and Andrew M. Frazer. The Park was filled and great enthusiasm prevailed. At the close of the meeting it was found that the roll contained 73 names. William E. Krateras first and William Johnston as second lieutenant, complete the company's organization. The company will be full by noon to day. A bounty of one hundred and two dollars is given in addition to the first month's pay.

Mr. Heckrothe of the White Swan Hotel, has received two letters during the present week from Samuel Herr—one from Richmond—the other from the U. S. Hospital, Davis Island, New York Harbor. Young Herr enlisted with Capt. Geo. H. Hess, and was wounded in the second day's battle before Richmond and taken prisoner. He writes home that he saw Captain Hess die on the 4th of July, in Richmond. That his wound—a musket shot in the thigh is entirely healed and that he really suffered but four days. He is now on parole and is ready and anxious to be exchanged and once more enter the battle field. Sammy is a brave boy.

The African church was discovered to be on fire on Thursday morning about three o'clock. The church is located on Green Lane, at the west end, far from pumps or any kind of water, and could not, possibly be saved. The colored school house—owned in common between the Borough and Township—adjoining the church and the dwelling of Peter George Sebastian, colored, also adjoining, were burned to the ground. It was, unquestionably, the work of an incendiary. It was set on fire once before, but was extinguished before doing much damage.

The order establishing a camp at Lancaster has been countermanded by the Governor, and the companies ordered to Harrisburg by this evening. No reason has been assigned that we can learn for this sudden change. A committee of Lancasterians waited on the Executive on Friday, but up to the hour of going to press we had not learned the result of the consultation. A great deal of dissatisfaction is felt in Lancaster at this move.

Capt. Miller's company has requested the "Patriotic Circle of Marietta" to find a name for their company, and as we go to press—Friday afternoon—the "Circle" is making arrangements to give the company a lunch before starting to-morrow—(Saturday morning at 11:23). Their will be a meeting in the Town Hall Park, this (Friday) evening when the name will be announced.

Hiram B. Swarr, for a long time chairman of the Democratic County Committee, has resigned and Richard R. Tshudy of Litz, elected in his place. This position, at this time, is not a coveted one; the organization being a little tainted with treason.

Capt. Frederick Pyfer, of Lancaster, with a company in the 7th Pennsylvania, has been promoted to the Majorship of the Regiment.

The second order for 300,000 men will, unquestionably, make a draft necessary, which will go into operation after the 15th instant. Although Lancaster county has already raised her quota for the last call, the decimated Pennsylvania regiments must also be filled up, so let the enlistments continue until all the old regiments are again filled. Go on now for the work is bravely begun.
