MARIETTA CAR TIME.—The several passenger trains leave "Upper-station" as follows: The morning train east at 7:15. The mail train, west at 11:25. The afternoon train east at 5:16. The evening train west at 6:55.

THE S. B. THOMAS RIFLES.—This fine company left upper station on Wednesday noon for Harrisburg. At an early hour the town was aroused by the sharp rattle of the drum and by car time a vast crowd had collected at the depot to witness the embarkation of the company. They numbered fifty-five rank and file: Captain William H. Eagle; first lieutenant, Harrison Roth; second lieutenant, William Kendig. This company left in better condition than any that had preceded it from this place; the boys were all in excellent spirits, having been empty provided with every comfort that a soldier could "lug along"—gun blankets, wollen shirts, overcoats, slawls, tin cups, knives, forks and spoons and large haversacks, (which, by the way, were made and presented by the Patriotic Circle) filled with "providence" for the inner man, and last, but not least, Capt. Eagle saw that his men should be fortified against any attack similar to the one made by the plug-uglies of Baltimore on the Massachusetts boys, by having his men armed with rifles and ten rounds of cartridge—thus they went forth prepared to defend themselves, and the State, "to the die."

There appears now to be no more doubt that John McAdams, Isaac Wolf-insberger and William Zundke are all prisoners in Richmond. Mrs. McAdams having, a few days since, received a letter from her husband. She says he writes that all was taken from the party but their clothing. They were a kind of sutler-peddlars and had their entire stock confiscated by the rebels. They say, however, that they are not badly treated.

Dr. Hinkle having resigned his commission in the U. S. Navy, his health forbidding another voyage—although greatly recovered but yet entirely unfitted for sea service. On Wednesday evening he received a communication from the War Department calling him to Washington, where a position is one of the hospitals in awaiting him. He left this [Saturday] morning for his new position.

Lieut. R. W. Smith, Jr., son of Esquire Smith of the Wrightsville Star, died from the effects of a wound in the thigh, on Sunday last week. He fell wounded at the second battle of Bull Run and lay for a long time without reaching the hospital at Washington the wound began to bleed anew and he sank during the operation of taking up the artery.

Godey's Lady's Book for October is on our table. This number contains seventy-four engravings, together with the usual variety of interesting reading, which is of the highest moral tone. Notwithstanding the distracting effects of the war, Godey is as usual, in the front rank of magazines.

The Fencible's Band of Lancaster returned to that city on Sunday last.—They had been attached to Col. Hambrigh's regiment, now stationed at Nashville, Tenn. They were recently discharged from service in compliance with an act of Congress dispensing with all Regimental bands.

We were treated on Monday night to a delightful serenade, by our friend Harry Wolfe, who had in charge the suspected spy, who, by the way, sings very sweetly and plays the guitar well. After all, however, there appears to be a want of something when we don't hear Harry's voice in the music.

Capt. W. H. Eagle has authorized Harry Wolfe to recruit for his company, the "S. B. Thomas Rifles," and forward the men to S. B. Thomas, Deputy Secretary of the Commonwealth, after whom the company has been called.

We observe by the Clearfield Batsman's Journal that our old friend, Samuel Mitchell, has been appointed deputy marshal of Clearfield Borough. Mr. M. will, unquestionably, make a fearless and intelligent officer.

The school directors of the township have erected a beautiful brick school house at the west end of the borough, immediately opposite Mr. Paul's residence.

Non. Thomas H. Barrows, the present State Superintendent of Common Schools is raising a cavalry company in Lancaster.

Our town was kept in quite an excited condition on Sunday and Monday last, in consequence of the arrest of a suspected rebel spy. A stranger calling himself Alexander, was arrested by a couple of Captain William H. Eagle's "S. B. Thomas Rifles," immediately after dinner on Sunday and taken to Heckrothe's White Swan Hotel and a guard of four soldiers placed around the house, where he was kept until Monday night. Every effort was made to find out "who and what he was," but in vain, and on Monday evening Capt. E. discharged him for want of cause to detain him. Many tales were in circulation about him but principally made up of gossip.

Mr. Levi Roberts formerly of this borough, died on Sunday last, at the residence of his brother, Hon. A. E. Roberts, Lancaster. Mr. Roberts' remains were brought to this borough and buried in Zion Church burying ground, from the residence of Rev. A. B. Grosh, on Tuesday afternoon last. Mr. R. was 55 years of age.

The Commissioners of the County who have all through our difficulties acted with commendable liberality, on Saturday last generously appropriated twenty thousand dollars to be applied to relieving the families of real needy volunteers. This is truly worthy of imitation.

The Susquehanna is exceedingly low.

Some time since, the lamented General Kearney ordered his officers to wear sewed on their caps a square bit of red flannel, that he might the more easily recognize them. They have determined to adopt this red badge as an honorary distinction, and their new commander, General Storeman, approves of it. Field and staff officers wear it on the crown of their caps; line officers on the front of their caps; and privates on the right side. In the next light in which they may be engaged, Kearney's men, with their badges, will avenge their beloved commander.

Mr. Ericsson has given the name of "Camacho" to the immense iron clad vessel now building in Jersey City, and intended to be the pioneer of a fleet for the protection of our Pacific coast. Crowds of workmen are employed upon the vessel. She is building in the yard as the Weebawken, only the latter being on the stocks nearest the water, must be launched first. The peculiar mode of building a mailed man-of-war, which, when finished in every way, can be taken apart piecemeal and transported like a portable mess chest, is very interesting.

George N. Sanders, who left for Europe, via Niagara, some weeks since, we see by our English papers, per Edinburgh, has arrived in Liverpool. The Telegraph, of that city, a semi-secular organ, announces with a flourish, that he is "bearer of despatches for the Confederate Commissioners, Messrs Mason and Slidell."

The men employed in the workshops of the Pennsylvania railroad at Harrisburg have formed into a military company. The company permits them certain hours to drill each week, without deducting from their wages the time so employed.

On Thursday evening seventy-two thousand troops had arrived at Harrisburg in response to the Governor's call, and more hourly arriving.

Wednesday the 17th day of September was the 74th anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution.

TRYING TO ESCAPE THE DRAFT.—A person dressed in female apparel, and who left Rochester, New York, for Niagara Falls, was observed to act in an uneasy manner, and, on examination, it was discovered that the person was a man in woman's clothes, and was making for Canada to escape the draft. He was put under arrest at Lockport. His name is Tallman, from Tallmanville, Pa., and he was formerly a postmaster under Buchanan.

This is an addition to the bounty of \$105 given by the town.
