Quartermaster General Hale very politely acknowledges the receipt of the last box from our Patriotic Circle. The General in his letter of thanks to Miss Emma Radvall, the efficient secretary of the Circle, says that there is at present enough of lint on hand, and that when more is wanted public notice will be given.

We received a letter from Lieutenant John M. Kline, Co. B. 45th Regiment P. V., in which we learn he was slightly wounded in the side; and William Sharp has since died of wound received. His letter will be found in another column. We omit the names of the wounded, because they were in our last issue.

Dr. Franklin Hinkle of this borough, formerly attached to the Navy, has been placed in charge of the Seminary Hospital, Georgetown, D. C. We learn that the Doctor is fast regaining strength. His surgical skill will soon place him in the front rank of his profession in the Army.

Oliver Cochran—"old Ollie," who enlisted with Captain E. D. Roath and was wounded by a musket shot—entering at the ear and coming out below the eye—at the second battle of Bull Run, and after suffering for seven days, died.

It is said "old Buck" has contributed one thousand dollars and Isaac E. Heister five hundred toward creating a fund to elect George M. Steinman to Congress, but it won't do, old Thad. will distance the iron monger aristocrat.

Dr. Sowerby, for some time a resident of our place but now attached to the Christian street Hospital, Philadelphia, has been paying a flying visit to his friends—and their name is legion—here. The Dr. returns to his post to-day.

In Camp near the Banks of the Potomac.

September 21, 1862.

FRIEND BAKER: We (our regiment) have passed through a series of engagements. And through all of which I escaped safely, with the exception of a slight bruise in the side, caused by a piece of spent shell. The loss in our regiment has been quite heavy, and in company B. proportionally large. Last Sunday our regiment became engaged, for the first time since entering the service. The battle took place at South Mountain, and was brought on by the skirmishers of our regiment being attacked. The rebels rushed to the attack with a yell, thinking to take us unprepared, but were met by the 45th with a yell equally as deafening, and a determination to conquer or die in the attempt. The battle resulted in a complete victory to our arms, but sorry to say, with a loss of one hundred and thirty odd to our regiment, in killed and wounded. The loss in company B. was two killed and seventeen wounded.—Company K. three killed and eleven wounded. Quite a number of prisoners were taken by our regiment, including two that were taken by myself, and two by Joe Bell. We slept all night on the battle field, and the next day resumed our march toward the enemy, who had taken advantage of the night by falling back. On Wednesday the 17th, we again met the enemy on the heights, near Sharpsburg. This time, although we made several successive charges, our loss was not so very great. The loss in the regiment amounted to about 25.—The loss of Co. B. amounted to six wounded; Co. K's loss amounted to six wounded. The only prisoners taken this time by the regiment were taken by Co. C. eight in all; seven privates, and one Captain, (Capt. Twigg's) a nephew of Gen. Twigg's. I have his sword in my possession, which with a steel sabre, and a Mississippi bowie knife, I intend to keep as mementoes of battles, in which, with the rest, I have participated in.—The next day three companies were thrown out as skirmishers, and were exposed to a severe fire of musketry, both by the rebels in front, and our own men behind us, until evening when we were relieved. The only loss sustained, was by Co. B, three were wounded. Since that time, and during intervals between engagements, we were under terrific artillery fire, until yesterday, when we arrived at this place, where we now remain recruiting from our week's hard work of fatigue and exposure. My time is limited, so that I cannot give any details, nor relate any particular instance of bravery shown by any particular one, as ALL (not one exception in the regiment of those who were engaged) fought bravely. Enclosed you will find a complete list of casualties in companies B. and K.; and the two Lancaster county companies, which you will please publish, as the publication may prove very satisfactory to the parents, relatives, and friends of the members of the aforesaid companies. If any information is wanted in regard to any of the dead or wounded, by any person, they will please write to me and I will attend to their desires immediately. I done all in my power to make the wounded comfortable, and have the dead decently buried. All our dead were buried side by side, with head boards to distinguish one from the other. Truly yours, J.
