

13 IIon. James Madison Porter died at his residence in Easton, Pennsylvania, on Tuesday morning of last

week, in the 70th year of his age. He was a son of General Andrew Porter, of the Revolutionary War. and a brother of the ex Gov. David R. Porter, and of the late Gov. George B. Porter of Michigan, formerly of Lancaster. The deceased filled many important positions, among them that of Secretary of War seedy, we left at an early hour, leaving under President Tyler, and was a leading member of the Reform Convention of 1837-8.
