Mr. James M. Hopkins, Conowingo Furnace, Lancaster county, Pa.—Sir: Your note of August 25, enclosing an order from Alger & Co., has been received. In reply to your queries, I have to state that a rifled 30 pounder, made in this yard from the iron you sent me, has been fired 2000 times, and is capable of enduring much more. This has given me a high opinion of your iron, particularly as it is cold blast. At the same time it demands proper treatment and fuzes slowly, not running so freely as other iron tried here. I regret the want of furnaces here, as it prevents me from having some guns made here of your iron. In thus expressing myself, however, I wish it to be distinctly understood that any one who uses this, or any other iron for navy cannon, does it on his own judgement and risk. Such guns will be inspected just as all others are, and will be received or rejected on their own merits.
