Printed notices, ordering tenants on the first of January to vacate the premises on the ensuing first of April, and blank leases, for sale at this office. The leases, or "articles of agreement" will be carefully filled up when desired.

In consequence of the urgent appeals made by a large number of the citizens of this county, the Commissioners have appointed committees throughout the county to visit all needy families and ascertain and report the names of all persons who are in actual want in consequence of their dependence on their husbands, parents or brothers, being in the service of the government. None will receive except those in actual want. The committee for this borough is composed of Rev. A. B. Grosh, Jacob Stahl, Geo. W. Mehaffey.

A private and confidential letter from Jacob Thompson, Buchanan's Secretary of the Interior, to a friend in the south, written in November 1860, whilst in Buck's cabinet, has come to light. In it Thompson says: "Buchanan is the truest friend to the South I have ever known from the north. He is a jewel and a man." Aye, what kind of a jewel? One of John Randolph's kind—that shines and stinks like a rotten mackerel by moonlight. Alas poor Buck! Once more cornered.

The ball season has set in. The Franklin House, Maytown, is to be the scene of a "Christmas Eve Hop" and our friend Heckrothe, of the White Swan—whose apppers always "lay-out" any gotten up in this borough, will give a grand ball on Christmas eve, and having engaged Miller's cotillion band, fno music may be looked for, to say nothing of the winds.

We are glad to learn that our former townsmen, Mr. William H. Goodyear, than whom a more obliging and courteous gentleman does not live, has gone into the mercantile business in the town of Lebanon. The new firm, Messrs. Goodyear & Diefenbach—J. R. Diefenbach of this place—went into operation a few weeks since. If a determination to please and high-toned honor mean anything in the mercantile business, Mr. G. is certain of success.

We received a hasty line from Harry Wolfe, a few days since, from Washington, stating that great preparations are being made in that city, for the reception of wounded soldiers. All the convalescents have been sent away and their room held in reserve for the daily expected arrivals from the late battle fields. Mr. W. asks our "Circle" to send on some clothing.

The Harrisburg Patriot speaking of exempts, says the number of drafted men in that county exempted from service by the Surgeon General, for various physical ailments, is twenty-seven. The list of exempts for Lancaster county greatly exceeds that of any other county in the State, amounting to three or four hundred.

Major Geo. W. Bardwell of Elizabethtown, attached to Col. Heenan's 11th Pennsylvania Regiment, was wounded in the wrist at the battle of Fredericksburg. The Colonel, Lieut. Colonel and Major were all wounded.—The regiment being in Meagher's brigade was in the hottest of the fight.

We observe that our borough authorities have been busy at the lower end of town, repairing the sidewalks—this is well—but why not continue the good work to Hopkins' corner. Do not make fish of one and flesh of another. Have the walks all made properly.

The severe wind and rain on Monday night, cleared the Susquehanna river of ice. The canal company had, on Saturday last, the ice boat at work and made the canal navigable, which will enable the boatmen to get to their homes.

We inadvertently omitted to state in our last, where to whom the last box was sent by our Patriotic Circle. It was forwarded to Mrs. A. H. Ropes, of the Union Hotel Hospital, Georgetown, D. C.

The M. E. Church will give their usual Annual Christmas exhibition on Christmas evening, commencing at half past six o'clock. Tickets to be obtained at the door. These exhibitions have always been pronounced very entertaining.

Colonel McCarter, the Lebanon Courier says, is no longer connected with the 93 Regiment, P. V. No reason is given for his withdrawal from the service.

At the sale of the late Peter Baker's real estate on Saturday evening last, the two-story brick dwelling was purchased by the widow, for twelve hundred and seventy-five dollars. The other house was postponed.

GENERAL THOMAS WELSH.—The Press pays a just and deserved tribute to Gen. Thomas Welsh of Columbia, in this county, but is in error in crediting him to Lebanon. The numerous friends of Thomas Welsh, the brave colonel of the gallant 45th Pennsylvania, to which belongs the honor of having turned the fortunes of the day in our favor at South Mountain, and which behaved with such marked heroism at Antietam, have been delighted to hear of his recent commission as a brigadier general of Volunteers. Brigadier General Welsh is from Columbia, Pennsylvania, and served with distinction in the Mexican war. Since the outbreak of the rebellion, in the spring of 1861, he has been in constant service, passing through the ranks of captain, major, lieutenant colonel, and colonel. His appointment as brigadier general was solicited by Governor Curtin and General Burnside, and the promptness with which the merits of this valuable officer were recognized is highly creditable to the powers that be, as it is also a deserved compliment to Pennsylvania. General Welsh will have a command in the Ninth Army corps.

We are right glad to congratulate our friend Welsh on his elevation. No man deserves it better. In Mexico, in South Carolina, at South Mountain, at Antietam, and now at Fredericksburg, he has shown his ability to lead the gallant 45th to certain victory.

Lieut. H. H. McClune, son of 'squire McClune, now in the penitentiary for forging land warrants, and a native of Lancaster county, we are sorry to say, has been tried by court martial under the following charges and found guilty: "1st. Conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline.

"2d. Conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman.

"3d. Uttering disloyal sentiments.

"The sentence is, that he be cashiered, and he be deprived of either holding an office or post of honor or trust under the United States, and that he be confined or imprisoned in the Old Capitol prison, or such other place as the Commanding General may direct, during the present rebellion, and that this sentence be published throughout the United States—to take effect on the day the sentence is approved."

Mr. Samuel Patterson has sold that beautiful three story brick dwelling house, adjoining his residence on Market street, which was erected only a few years ago by Mr. S. Patterson Sterrett, at a cost of over six thousand dollars, to Dr. William B. Fahnestock of Lancaster, who intends to locate in our borough for the purpose of practicing his profession. This is unquestionably one of the finest residences in the county.
