LOCAL PERSONALS:—Capt. Frederick S. Pyfer, formerly of Lancaster, has been recommended for Lieutenant Colonel of the 77 P. V., by the line officers of the regiment. Jacob S. Delleit formerly of Columbia, and for a short time in Dr. Greve's drug store in Market street, died very suddenly in Philadelphia, last week.
