Attendance at the Marietta High School. Mr. Baker:—Will you please insert the following report showing the attendance of the High School pupils during this term:

The first column of numbers represents the number of days each pupil was absent; the second the number of days in attendance during the term, from which the time when each entered school can easily be calculated.

A monthly report of a similar character, from every school, would in a great degree lessen the great evil of irregular attendance, from which some of the other schools have suffered more seriously than this.

Camp near Murfreesboro', Tenn.

MARCH 9, 1863.

Mr. Baker:—Since my last letter, with the exception of our flag presentation, little has transpired of interest to the reader. Gen. Rosecrans, after taking possession of Murfreesboro', set to work to fortify it in the most formidable manner, and had between 6000 and 8000 soldiers working upon the intrenchments daily. They are nearly completed and cover the north and east side of the city.

The 3d brigade, consisting of the 79th Penn 1st and 21st Wisconsin and 24th Ill. Regts, of Infantry and 4th Indiana and 1st Kentucky Batteries of artillery, were formed for inspection at 11 o'clock A. M.
