The lack of locals and our usual variety of news matter is to be accounted for by our absence on the river—being a timber measurer—but next week we hope to stir-up and make amends for our present short comings.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the "First National Bank of Marietta," on Saturday afternoon last, the following gentlemen were elected directors for the first fiscal year: John Haldeman, John Musser, John Hollinger, S. F. Eagle, A. H. Musselman, Barr Spangler, James Mehaffy, B. F. Hiestand, Jacob E. Kreybill. At the same time, the old banking building, almost immediately opposite the cross keys tavern, was selected as the location for the bank. Every effort will be made to put the association in operation immediately.

The Timber business, has, during the present week, been exceedingly brisk, leading off at prices from 15 to 18 cents for pine and from 22 to 26 cents for oak. The shore is still lined with rafts with a downward tendency in prices. Very few board rafts have passed here.

We received the following letter from our former townsman, W. T. Strachan, now a sutler at Albuquerque, New Mexico, which we cheerfully publish:

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., March 30, '63. Mr. Editor.—Thinking that it may not be amiss to communicate a few lines through the columns of your excellent journal to the friends and relatives of the late Lieutenant Mishler, I as one of his friends, and being a native of the same State and county, embrace this opportunity of expressing to the friends of the deceased a few lines in honorable mention of the brave and noble young patriot who unhesitatingly rushed on to almost certain death while fighting his country's battle on the field of Valverde, and whose remains are about to be received by his friends to be interred by them. Lieutenant Mishler had been stationed in this Territory about one year previous to his death, and during that time was respected and loved by every one who became acquainted with him for his gentlemanly deportment and his high-toned character, which was evinced in all his business and associations; among his brother officers he stood high in esteem for his excellent qualities as a true soldier and comrade. At the battle of Valverde he was detached from his command in Co. I, U. S. I., and attached to Captain McKens battery, which was stationed on the right wing of the army and against which the concentrated attack of the rebels in force was made at three different times. For some unaccountable reason Gen. Canby, the commander of the Federal troops, ordered the infantry supports from Capt. McKens battery to another part of the field, leaving it entirely unsupported; at that time Lieut. Mishler met a friend and took his hand bidding him adieu, and saying that this will be the last time that we will ever speak together. Upon being asked why, he remarked that he believed that he was going to be killed, about this time the Texans made their third charge upon the battery; the men of the battery had nearly all been killed in the two previous charges; and Lieut. Mishler loaded and fired one of the pieces by himself several times, his piece being one of the last that was discharged before the battery fell into the hands of the enemy, and after the battle he was found lying near the body of Major Lockridge, who led the battalion of the enemy and took the battery. It is claimed by many here that he killed the notorious Texan "Lockridge" with his pistol as he was in the act of laying his hand upon one of the guns and claiming that he took the battery. To give some idea of the desperate resistance with which those brave soldiers fought, I will state that the enemy were literally lying in heaps in front of the battery; and the artillery-men fought until there was but one officer and four men left unhurt. The foregoing sketch of the battle of Valverde, so far are potent to almost every one in this Territory, and to do justice and accord the proper meed, an able pen to mine should write this communication, but believing that this may not be an unfit intrusion, and that although commonplace and unpretending, it may be gratifying to the friends and relatives of the noble and true soldier who fell in his country's cause while fighting almost alone against overpowering numbers to defend the flag of our country, doubtless regretting that he had not more lives to offer up upon the altar of his country; and the memories that will cluster around him for his bravery will never be forgotten.
