A fatal railroad accident occurred at Loman Place on Wednesday morning which resulted in the death of Jacob Dissinger, a brakeman, who was coupling cars while in motion and fell between the cars on the track, the cars cut off both legs and one arm. He died two hours after.

The County Ticket settled on Wednesday last is a most unexceptionable one; the best we have had for years; such a legislative ticket—with one exception—has rarely been presented to the people of this county; in fact, the entire ticket is capital.

The building fever appears to have fairly started in our place. Mr. Geo. Augustus Mohling has resumed operations on his new brick building on Front street, making three large brick residences within a few squares, and say nothing of the number of frame ones.

The Delegate meeting on Saturday evening last was a most complete farce, Copperheads, Woodward men and alions participating. The more genteel portion of the Union party left the ground in disgust and without voting.

The war department has decided against admitting the city excess which Lancaster claimed in the last draft. The committee, Geo. M. Kline and Mayor Sanderson, has returned to that city and the conscripts will have to prepare to buckle on their armor.

Father Balf, for the past nine years priest of Saint Mary's Catholic Church, Lancaster, died near Philadelphia on Thursday last. He was 37 years of age.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.—As the public schools will open on next Monday, it may not be amiss to say a few words in regard to them. We have always found that during the first few weeks of the term there were many vacant seats, which ought to have been occupied by those who dread entering the school the first day of the term. This is wrong. Every pupil ought to be present the very first day, so that the teachers might properly classify them. It is taken for granted that every teacher will form his classes the first day; and hence any one entering afterwards will more or less retard the progress of his class. This is more particularly true in the Secondary and High Schools.

In Lancaster city every pupil is obliged to take his seat on the first day, or forfeit it during that session. If this could be accomplished in this place, it would be a great advantage to both teacher and scholars.

The School Board is determined to place the schools in a proper condition. If, therefore, those who are capable of entering higher classes, are not present when these classes are formed, and in consequence of which be placed in lower classes, they must find fault with themselves, and not blame the School Board or the teachers. A course of this kind is absolutely necessary. The Board of Directors and Teachers of the Secondary Schools and High School will meet all applicants in the High School room on Monday evening next, at 6 o'clock, for the purpose of examining them, and those whom they find qualified, they will promote; and the others, if any, will be retained in the Secondary until the next regular time for promotion.

It will be observed that none can enter the High School unless regularly promoted; and none will be promoted unless on merit.

Much fault is frequently found by parents, in the teacher, because the parents do not understand the conditions of the school. We would therefore urge upon every mother and father, or sister, or brother, to frequently visit the schools, and if the teacher does not pursue the course such visitor thought best, consult the teacher privately upon that point or method. If this course were pursued, the progress of the schools would be two hundred per cent. better.

DELTA. VICKSBURG.—This "terraced city," as Mr. Filmore called it, derives the name from Mr. Newitt Vick, deceased, and was originally incorporated by an act of the Legislature of Mississippi, passed January 29, 1825. Its rapid growth up to the passage of the act of secession by Mississippi is attributable to the cotton trade, which was nearly 3,000,000 bales per annum.

Deserters from the rebel army, reaching our lines, state that General Stuart has been relieved from his command of the rebel cavalry in Virginia, and that Gen. Hood supersedes him.—The rebels are recruiting their cavalry and otherwise reorganizing their forces, thus giving signs of active movements.

Shoemaking is done extensively in Haverhill by the women. The Banner says they work in gangs of six or seven hands each, the same as most of the young men do, and make the shoes right straight out, from the lasting to the finishing.

General Eisk telegraphs from Pilot Knob, Mo., that Col. Woodson has made a cavalry raid into Arkansas and captured over one hundred guerrillas, including Gen. Jeff. Thompson and his staff.
