BRIDGE OVER THE SUSQUEHANNA.—The construction of the bridge over the Susquehanna at Havre de Grace is now progressing vigorously. The entire length will be thirty-five hundred feet.

A member of a colored regiment, a native of Africa, writes thus quaintly in a private letter: "We have experienced no fight as yet, but I sincerely wish we would have one, so as to give us a chance to show ourselves, and for ever solve the mystic problem of negro prophecies in the qualities of a soldier."

The Potawatomi Indians who are in Washington, representing about 200 of the tribe now in Iowa, had an interview with the Acting Commissioner of Indian Affairs, on Wednesday.

The Maryland colored regiment, recruited in Baltimore, made a dress parade on Thursday of last week, from their encampment near the Park, through the city.

The steamer Schofield has arrived from Charleston with dates to the 25th ultimo. General Gilmore is still actively engaged in mounting heavy siege guns.

HORRIBLE MURDER.—Wm. H. Buckman and wife, who resided near Sadsburyville, Chester county, were found, on Friday morning, brutally murdered. One of the sons, hearing a noise in the house, about 1 o'clock in the night, went into his mother's room, and there he found his mother dead; stabbed in the neck. His father was missing, and after search his body was found about one hundred yards west of the house.

ARREST OF CLEGGAN.—Rev. Frederick Gibson, rector of the Episcopal church, and Principal of the Chestnut Hill Academy, Baltimore, was arrested a few days since, by order of Major General Schoenck, on the charge of disloyalty.

MURDER IN PENNSYLVANIA.—On Friday of last week an Englishman named Charles Weldon, was killed in Pottsville by a soldier who had been quarrelling with the landlord with whom Weldon boarded. Weldon ran out of the back door. He was ordered to halt by the soldier, who refused, and the soldier fired. The ball from the pistol hit Weldon in the breast, causing almost instant death.

Volunteering in the rural districts of Pennsylvania has been on the increase during the month of September. By the monthly reports of the recruiting officers stationed in various parts of the commonwealth it appears that the number of men recruited in August exceeds that of any previous month this year.

At a Union meeting held in Toledo, Ohio, on the 16th ult. the procession was nine and a half miles long. At the least calculation it contained 30,000 persons, and was four hours in passing a given point.

The Union sentiment in Memphis and vicinity is gathering strength daily. Over fifteen thousand persons have already taken the oath of allegiance. Many rebel prisoners are included in this number.
