Our usual variety is greatly curtailed this week in consequence of the lengthy description of the Farmer's and Gardener's Exhibition.

Mr. Jacob Gottshall, of the "Hot House, near the Upper Station, had some mammoth Prince Albert Potatoes at the late exhibition. They were the largest we ever saw, and of fine taste and very mealy, when cooked, which we know for we had a trial of them. Mr. G. has been quite successful as a fruit and vegetable grower.

A most shocking accident occurred on Wednesday afternoon last, at the Musselman Limestone quarry, adjoining this place, by which James McCann, a laborer in the quarry, lost a leg. It appears that a loose piece of rock fell into the quarry upon his foot completely severing it at the ankle, leaving the foot in the shoe. Dr. Landis, and Dr. John J. Sowerby, who is on duty, from the naval service, awaiting the readiness of his vessel for service, and on a flying visit to our place, attended the wounded man and found amputation immediately below the knee joint necessary. He is now doing as well as could be expected.

Rev. John Walker Jackson, pastor of the Locust Street M. E. Church, Harrisburg, will deliver his very able and eloquent address on "The Union, The Constitution—Peace," on Friday evening next, October 9th, at seven o'clock. None should fail to hear this celebrated divine, being regarded as one of the most eloquent preachers in the M. E. Church. Some very fine music will also entertain the occasion. Mr. Jackson delivered this address to Harrisburg, some time since, where it was pronounced something very finished and eloquent.

Hon. Milton C. Rogers, at one time a prominent member of the Lancaster Bar, died, to Philadelphia on Sunday morning, in the 78th year of his age. He was born in the State of Delaware, and after graduating at Princeton College, he studied law at Litchfield, Conn. He removed to this State and took up his residence in Lancaster city. His son became one of the leaders of the bar, at that time filled by distinguished men. On the election of John Andrew Shultz as Governor of this State, Judge Rogers became Secretary of the Commonwealth, and on the 15th of April, 1826, Gov. Shultz commissioned him one of the Justices of the Supreme Court. After the adoption of the new Constitution he was re-commissioned to the same office by Governor Porter, and continued on that bench until 1854.
