It appears the Copperheads had a kind of "swarm" meeting at Maulick's Lager Beer Saloon, at the eastern end of town, where German Woodward men could "get beirish free blow," and toward midnight a "free fight" followed "free lager," and it is supposed in the fight one of the combatants was knocked senseless on the railroad track and awoke in eternity, having, during the night, been run over by three or four burden trains. In the morning the mangled remains of the German, whose name we did not learn, were found adjoining the track, so frightfully cut up and disfigured as almost to defy recognition. Esquire Auxer held an inquest; verdict, killed by being run over by a railroad train. The man left a wife, who was confined to bed at the time. He was' employed at Haldeman's furnace. His mangled remains were put into a store-box (without being taken to his home) and buried the same morning.

The grand mass meeting at the "Perry House," on Monday evening, was a most complete fizzle. John Wise -balloon-blow-horn Wise-attempted to address the unterrified Cops, but before he got through his harangue against the administration, a general cry was raised for young Fulmer, a young and patriotic son of the "mine host" of the "Perry," who took the stand and delivered a patriotic Union speech, Wise, in the meantime seeing the turn of things, took the back track for Houseal's-the great centre for Copperheads-and, it is supposed, hid himself behind the paunch of that worthy landlord. In a word, the meeting gave three cheers for Curtin and three groans for Woodward. Thus ended the mountain of labor, which brought forth a mouse, for the Cops finding themselves outnumbered by patriotic Union men, left disgusted with "man's inhumanity to man," and took another glass of lager, swearing vengeance on the d-d abolitionists.

No cause, other than his failing health, could be assigned for the rash act.
