The vigcette on the left hand side of the face contains an allegorical reprekentation, which is also another idea of Mr. Liucolu's. It consists of a picture of Columbus presenting America, in the form of an Indian ma.den, to the Old World, personified by three, figures, representing Europe, Asia and Africa .-In the foliage overhead is the figure five, handsomely ornamented.

The novel peculiarity, of the border is that no two words, tigures or scrolls are exactly alike, having been varied purposely, so that the courterfeiter may not be able to imitate the note by repeating small portions, as is frequently noticed in spurious money. In order to imitate these notes the connterfeiter will find it necessary to engrave the whole with the minutest nicety.

The back of the note displays another beautiful exhibition of ingenuity and taste. The principal vignette is a large oval, extending over the greater part of the back, reproducing Vanderlyn's famons picture in the rotunda of the Capitol at Washington, representing the landing of Columbus. The picture is printed in black, as are also the legends which surround it. The upper legend is as follows :

This note is receivable at par in all parts of the United States in payment of all taxes and excises and all other dues to the United States except duties on imports; and also for al salaries and all other debts and demands owing by the United States to individuals, corpo-rations and associations within the United States, except interest on public debt. United

The lower legend is as follows :-

Every person making an engraving, or aid-ing to make or engrave, or passing or attempt-ing to pass, any imitation or alteration of this note, and every person having in possession a plate or impression made in imitation of it, or any paper made in imitation of that on which this note is printed, is, by act of Congress, ap-proved 25th of February, 1863, guilty of fel-ny, and subject to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, or imprisonment not exceed ng fifteen years, or both.

The border and pieces are printed in green. The bordor is made up of the figure 5 on a shield repeated. In the top border occur the words "mational currency."

The end piece to the left contains an oval with the coat of arms of Pennsylvania, excisitely engraved, the name of the state being engraved in the cloud work. The oval at the right end contains the eagle on the national shield, with the cypher "U. 
