Dr. J. G. Stehmon of this place died at the residence of his cousin, Samuel H. Brown, in New Orleans, whither he had gone for the benefit of his health, on the 6th instant. He will be buried from his father's residence, near Market street, on to-morrow (Sunday) afternoon at one o'clock.

Quite a brisk business is now being done in the Tobacco business in this borough. Mr. Jacob A. Wisner is purchasing very largely for a Baltimore firm, and engaged the Hopkins warehouse where an immense amount is being received and will be packed and sent to the city. Prices, we understand, range from 6 and 13, 7 and 14, &c. A large amount of the weed was raised in this vicinity during the past year, and at present prices, will be a valuable crop.

At a recent meeting of the Teachers of the Presbyterian Sabbath School, on motion of Mr. Samuel Lyndsay, seconded by Mr. Thomas Zell, a vote of thanks was tendered the Girod Brothers, in connection with Mr. and Mrs. Harry Wolfe, for the material aid they have rendered in procuring a library for the school—the proceeds of their concert amounting to Eighty-nine dollars and sixty-two cents. Mr. Samuel Lyndsay also donated a handsome book-case to the school.

Col. Samuel C. Stambaugh died at his residence near Lancaster, a few days since. Col. Stambaugh had been a prominent actor in the politics of this State for over forty years. In early life he was a Printer, having learned the trade in the office of William Dickson, the first editor and proprietor of the Lancaster Intelligencer. He was, we think, the first editor in Pennsylvania to bring Gen. Jackson's name forward for the Presidency. He had occupied many responsible positions. The last public position he held was that of Surveyor General in Utah, from which he returned a little over a year ago. He had a strong, robust constitution, and had been sick but a short time. He was 65 years old.

Sergeant-Major Sigmond E. Wisner is now on a visit to his parents, in this borough. He is attached to Col. Hambright's regiment, and returned with the regiment a few days since. The 70th having re-enlisted returns home to recruit its ranks before re-entering the field.

J. Scott Patterson of this borough, but for a long time in Libby Prison and on Belle Isle, has returned to this borough. Scott has seen rough service since wearing Uncle Sam's uniform and looks very much broken down, having been a long time sick.

Dr. Horace West, a short time since practicing in this borough, but recently of Bainbridge, died very suddenly in that village a week or ten days since. The Doctor was universally beloved and his loss will be much felt in that vicinity.
