Marietta, Saturday, July 9, 1864.

We paid a flying visit to Reading, Ephrata springs and Litz on the 4th instant, and whilst at Reading called on our former townsman, Charley Longenderfer, who has leased Laner's Celebrated Lager Beer establishment on Chestnut street, below Third. This is one of the most extensive Gardens of its kind we have ever seen. It occupies at least half-a-block and is enclosed by a high fence—filled with fine shade trees and innumerable large and small tables upon which "to hide" lager and sweitzer case, or a glass of fine Reinisch wine. Gas is introduced all over the garden and in the centre of the grounds there is a fine stand—some 12 or 15 feet high—for a hand to disclose faderland strains. Upon the whole it is a great business place and Charley must be coining money.

This vicinity is in great tribulation just now. The refugees from Maryland, Cumberland, Adams, Franklin and York counties are crowding the ferries at this point, and at Columbia to get, with their horses and live stock, on this side of the Susquehanna, bringing with them all kinds of tales of the doings and number of the rebels. The "Glatz ferry," opposite this place, was worked double-handed during the whole of Thursday night, and droves of horses were hourly seen going through town.

The Fourth of July passed off very quietly in our place. Several picnics—lovers and Good Templars—a hop at the St. John House and an oration in the town Hall. The town, however, was thinned out to go to Reading, Ephrata Springs and Litz. The Columbia and Reading Railroad did a "rushing" business with their fourth excursion to those places. The crowd at the Litz Spring on the evening of the fourth was immense.

Gov. Curtin calls for twelve thousand militiamen for one hundred days. Col. Joseph W. Fisher, who has shown great bravery with the Pennsylvania Reserves, is in the field to raise a regiment under this call. It is to be hoped the regiment will be raised speedily without any difficulty.

G. W. Brandt & Co., Columbia, have turned out this season 1782 of their patent horse rakes. This is what we would call a "big turn-out."

The Rebel Raid.—The President informed Governor Seymour that a rebel force estimated at 15000 to 20,000 strong have invaded Maryland, taken Martinsburg and Harper's Ferry, and are threatening other points. The public safety requires a call upon the State Executive for a militia force to repel invasion, and he calls upon the State of New York for 12000 militia as per quota, to serve for one hundred days.

The Buffalo Commercial says: Lieutenant Frank E. Brownell, the avenger of Colonel Ellsworth, was in Jamestown, Chautauqua county, last week. He is stopping with Mr. David Brownell, in Ellery, at present. He is a lieutenant in the regular service, and is now on half pay, on account of poor health.

A call has been published for 5000 Massachusetts volunteers for garrison duty near Washington; non-commissioned officers and privates to receive \$20 per month from the State Treasury while in the service.

The pirate Alabama has been overhauled by the Kearsage and sunk. The President has suspended the writ of habeas corpus in Kentucky.

All drafted men in Hollis, Mass. who go, are to be paid \$300 in gold.

The Northumberland Bank will be removed to Sunbury.
