TOWN BOUNTY MEETING.—A citizens meeting was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday evening last, to adopt measures to fill the quota of Marietta borough (38) by obtaining volunteers. J. J. Libhart, Esq., was called to the chair and Col. W. H. Eagle, appointed secretary. After the object of the meeting was stated by the chair and the subject discussed, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted.

Resolved, That the Burgess and Town Council be and are hereby earnestly requested to pay a bounty not exceeding \$300 to all persons who are mustered into the service, to the credit of this borough, under the present call, providing the number does not exceed thirty-eight.

Resolved, That all persons who shall put in a substitute to the credit of this borough on the present call, shall receive the like sum, not to exceed \$300.

Resolved, That in raising the money to pay the bounties contemplated in the foregoing resolutions, we deem it just that the corporate authorities should issue bonds payable some years hence, so that they may not interfere with any subsequent demands for immediate cash that may be required to meet emergencies that may arise hereafter.

The meeting also appointed a committee to petition the legislature at its special session, to pass a Militia law that will qualify every man subject to militia duty to respond to a call "to arms" at the shortest notice.
