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



TREATMENT OF SUNSTROKE .- Warm weather and hot suns are now upon us, and we may expect more or less of covp de soliel, or sunstroke, to follow. A person whose uncovered head is exposed to the rays of a vertical sun is not unfrequently attacked with a sort of fit, which sometimes bears a semblance to apoplexy, but at other times is more an ordinary swoon. The proper remedy for an attack of this kind; during the primary fit, is to pour cold water over the head. This is the plan pursued by the natives of India, who are particularly exposed to the affection in question . It is said that sunstroke may be avoided by wearing a handkerchief or claip soaked in cold water in one's hat while exposed to the direct rays of the sun
