Clay, to cross Mason & Dixon's line for the defence of Washington, at the breaking out of the present rebellion. He also furnished me with a few data of those times, which I hope will be interesting to the friends and descendants of the worthy men composing that roll.

More than fifty years have elapsed since those men, patriots of our borough and vicinity, formed themselves into a company, with the view, of marching to the defence of Baltimore, (Washingtonthe capital of our country, having fallen into the hands of the British vandals, who burned it,) but by an lextra order of Governor Simon Snyder, were ordered to the defence of Philadelphia and afterwards sent to Camp Marcus Hook. It would be gratifying to Major Jones, and no doubt to the others, if any, to know how many of that gallant band still survive, and their present whereabouts.

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
