It proved to be a soldier, named Samuel Freeborn, of the twentieth New York Cavalry, now sta-

tioned at Norfolk. The woman appeared and confessed she was aiding the man to desert in this way. He had been in the trunk several days, and slept there rather comfortably, but it is supposed he finally suffocated. or was either killed by the trunk being carelessly knocked about, or was frozen to death. The woman makes a clean confession of her complicity, and is now in jail to await trial for aiding desertion, and murder.
