The whole number of days taught up to that time was sixty-two. It will be seen that the attendance in general is very regular, which is very gratifying to the teacher, as well as very conducive to the progress of the school.

Half days in the report are counted whole days. A report of the conduct and progress of each pupil would doubtless be interesting to parents, but that will be omitted for the present. When it becomes possible to append to each name the mark "Good," that report will be published. In the meantime I would most earnestly ask parents to visit the school and see for themselves whether or not their children and the teacher are in all respects such as the students and teacher of a High School ought to be.
