The Susquehanna is now (Friday afternoon) frightfully high-over the towing-path and coming on Front street the canal and river have been one and running full of drift wood and saw logs since morning. From present appearances much damage will be done unless the water soon falls. "Everybody and the rest of mankind" is catching wood -any quantity can be caught with a pole and hook without going off the cailroad track. Since writing the above great damage has been done by the water. At this writing (Saturday noon) the river is still rising and is now several feet higher than in 1846, when the Harrisburg bridge was swept away and at which time the river was supposed to have been higher than at any other time within the recollection of the "oldest inhabitant." 
