The remains of Lieutenant William II. Child, who was killed about ten months since, were brought to his home, in this place on last Saturday and deposited in the Union League Rooms until Sunday afternoon, when there was a grand funeral pageant. The League having taken charge of the remains—he had been made a member on his last leave of absence home, only a short time before he was killed-the funeral services took place in their council room, in Temperance Hall, (which was crowded to suffocation,) by a few remarks from President John Jay Libhart, and a sermon from the Chaplain, Rev. Mr. Clawges and prayer by Rev. Mr. Matthias. The cortege was formed at the Town Hall door, headed by the Mount Joy Band, followed by the Leagne, returned soldiers, citizens, etc., which proceeded to the cemetery, where the remains were deposited in the family burial lot of his grandfather, the late Wm. Child, esq. It was, unquestionably, the largest funeral which has ever taken place in this borough.

Our town on Monday was the scene of the greatest possible excitement on the receipt of the war dispatches-business of almost every kind for a time was suspended and "everybody" turned out for "a gay old time." As the copperheads had stolen Heckrothe's little cannon, old musket blunderbusses were brought into requisition and loaded almost even with the muzzle and laid in the streets and blazed away. The Church, Town Hall and Fire Hall bells were rung and a gladsome smile was upon nearly everybody's face.
