Cochran the community and the League lost a true lover of his country, who, actuated by a sense of duty and true patriotism, left his home, family, and friends, and was among those who were the first to enrol themselves in defence of their country's Flag, and by his valor raised himself to notice and promotion.

Resolved, That the members of this League are requested to attend his funeral from the home of his family.
