Letter from Captain Ettla's Company.

Near Dover, Del., May 8, 1865. Mr. Editor :- I take the liberty of sending you the muster roll of Captain George H. Ettla's company (Co. B.,) 215 Regiment, P. V., with the hope that you may find time and space to insert the same in "The Mariettian." The list includes all that were mustered nto the company at Camp Cadwallader, ninety men; although we now only number 85; four were assigned us from the guard house the day before we left Philadelphia, but three of them deserted within twenty-four hours thereafter. We still have fewer absentees than any other company in the regiment; whilst our regiment was participating in the solemnities in honor of our late President, in Philadelphia, nearly all of the companies lost from five to thirty men each, we claim the special honor of being the only company that lost none on that solemn occasion.

We are pleasantly located, at present, within about two-and-a-half miles of Dover, the capital of Delaware. Our camp has been named "Camp Wistar," in honor of our Colonel and Brigade Commander.
