A TRIP DOWN THE RIVER :- The river business has again been brought to a stand still-the river being too low to run -and nothing here now to run. The country along the entire line looked very fine-verifying to a truth that Lancaster is the garden county of the State. At the "Buck" we found our conveyance in waiting and the patience of the driver almost exhausted, saying, as he saw us approach, that he was just about hitching up to start-having been there from 12 o'clock -atthis time it was four. After "whetting our whistles" at the "Buck," we Were soon seated in our comfortable Carriage and on our way to Lancaster, where we arrived at 7 o'clock, literally covered with dust and as "hungry as bears," having had nothing since 5 o'clock in the morning, save a couple of sandwiches a piece. After partaking of we turned homeward, arriving at halfpast ten, very tired but bighly pleased with our trip. The party is greatly indebted to Mr. Shields, the pilot, who took great pains to explain all the important points on the way, as Stahls, Bald-friar, Hessians, Frys, Indian Steps, Devil's Thumb, Ellises, Turkey Hill, Neal's, and various other points, making the entire passage down very interesting and entertaining.
