The National Teachers' Association will hold its seventh session in the Hall of the House of Representatives, at Harrisburg, on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, the 16th, 17th and 18th days of August next. Among the persons looked for addresses are Hon. Thaddeus Stevens, and Prof. J. P. Wickersham, of the State Normal School, Millersville, this county. The former's subject is not mentioned—that of the latter is, "Education, as an Element in the Reconstruction of the Union."

A terrible tornado passed over Willow Street and Lampeter Square, four or five miles south of Lancaster, on Wednesday evening, blowing down houses, tearing up trees, completely carrying horses and cows into the air and landing them several hundred yards away; the destruction of property is said to have been considerable.

Judge Hays gives notice that on Saturday next (29th) an examination will take place in the Lancaster High School, for the vacancy in the United States Naval Academy, to be filled by Hon. Thaddeus Stevens. The following qualifications will be required: "Must be over 14 years of age and under eighteen, at the time of the examination for admission; must be free from deformity and disease and imperfections of the senses; they must be of good moral character, able to read and write well—writing from dictation and spelling with correctness—and to perform with accuracy the various operations of the primary rules of arithmetic, viz: Addition, and the addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers."

The Harrisburg Telegraph awards great praise to the Pennsylvania Railroad for its prompt transportation of troops, supplies and munitions of war during the rebellion. It ascribes the superior arrangement of this road to the great practical ability of Col. Thomas A. Scott. We believe it is conceded everywhere that Col. Scott has few rivals as a railroad officer in the world.
