

We were considerably alarmed by a report that obtained circulation on Sunday last, that Barr Spangler, Esq., was dying of Typhoid Fever—that Dr. Cameron, of Wilmington, Del., had been telegraphed for, and that, in the meantime, Dr. Armor, of Columbia, had been called in. Much anxiety respecting the fate of our esteemed friend was manifested by all classes, and it was earnestly and universally wished that we might not thus suddenly and unexpectedly be called to mourn the untimely loss of one of our most valuable citizens.

Mr. Spangler being a thorough believer, as well as a practitioner, in the Hygienic system of Medicine, had been treated in the premises on strictly Hygienic principles, and it was not until his family felt alarmed for his safety that medical assistance was called for. Dr. Armor saw him and prescribed for him, on Sunday evening, and on Monday morning Dr. Cameron arrived and gave us the comforting assurance that he would yet recover. We felt thankful for this intelligence, for Marietta could ill afford to lose the services of Mr. Spangler. We would not be invidious, but of all our citizens, Mr. Spangler, it is well known, is the first and foremost in every good work. He has long and earnestly contended for a Government based on equal justice to all classes of citizens, irrespective of either creed or color, and has now an opportunity to rejoice in seeing that the Southern slaveholders, by their own wicked rebellion, have themselves broken the fetters which they forged for their unfortunate fellow beings. As a philanthropist, a friend of education, of Health reform, of Temperance, and of every other kindred movement that promises, in any way, to ameliorate the condition of his fellow men, Mr. S., has no superior in Marietta; and we trust that he will long be spared to bless the community with his labors of love.

Sergeant Lichteberger, step-son of John Noel, formerly keeper of the Glaz Ferry, at this place, was the only Mariettian amongst the lost on board of the ill-fated Quinobang, off Moorehead city. He and a comrade were hanging on to a piece of the wreck, when coming near shore, the sergeant being a good swimmer, said he would swim to shore, but a breaker struck him and he sank to rise no more.

Mr. W. H. Stilwell, architect and builder of Mr. Duffy's handsome residence at the "west-end" of our borough, is about to leave for Sunbury, Pa., where he is engaged to erect a large bank building and mansion. Mr. S. is an accomplished artisan, as his work on Mr. Duffy's building clearly attest, which is admitted by all to be the finest piece of workmanship outside of Philadelphia.
