A PRINTER'S PR:—Just as we were about putting our outside form to press, on Thursday morning, and whilst the first page was being set against the imposing stone, an advertiser came rushing in—a little late and in a great hurry—and whilst explaining his business, thoughtlessly threw his foot around behind him—and struck the form—and away went the page with a smash to the floor—making the most unpalatable looking pi a printer ever beheld. Imagine our feelings at seeing this heap of mixed type, at the "tail end of the week," and had we been a sweating man, we would have sworn what a Yankee calls a "blue streak," but, being a cool, matter-of-fact, "was-to-happen" creature, we told our customer his little job would have to lay over for a day or two, and we went vigorously to work to repair damages. In consequence, we have been compelled to put two columns of advertisements on the first page and omit several intended for this week's issue. This has been the only case of pi-ing a form in our experience of over twenty six years in a printing office, and—the Lord willing,—may it be the last.

On Friday evening last, as a burden train, awaiting the arrival of the evening passenger train, was backing into the siding attached to the freight depot, in order to shift some cars containing cattle, a part of the side track gave way, precipitating one of the box cars over a small embankment, killing one of the steers and injuring several others. The cars were turned upside down and the cattle had to be taken from the top of the cars.

The Conowingo Bridge across the Susquehanna, which was partly flooded away last Spring, is now substantially repaired and ready for crossing, through the industry and perseverance of the Directors, at a cost of \$10,000 to the Stockholders. Three times as this bridge been damaged by the Union troops and citizens for fear of a rebel invasion, and once in 1861, by the Marshall Kane party of Baltimore, for fear of Union troops crossing to aid Baltimore and keep down Secession.

We learn, from the Columbia Spy, that through the indefatigable exertions of Col. C. S. Kauffman, President of the Columbia and Port Deposit Railroad, that that enterprise will, at once, be put under contract. We know that Col. K., has left nothing undone, for some time, to push forward this work.
