Providence permitting to-morrow (Sabbath) Rev. Jos. Castle, D. D., will preach at 10 A. M., in the M. E. Church, and in the evening the pastor, Rev. Wm. Matthias—subject—the Prodigal Son.

Quite an accident happened to the Marietta accommodation train, on Tuesday last, as it was going to Columbia. It was met in front of Col. Myers' "Dovecote Farm," by a "run-a-way engine." The collision was of such force as to completely demolish both engines. It appears that an engine "hooter" was "fixing-up" the regular locomotive, which takes our train from Columbia to Philadelphia, and he became frightened at the speed he had placed upon it, and jumped off, leaving it run at full speed, through Columbia toward Marietta, meeting our train at the above point. The passengers on the train were all more or less injured from the sudden shock; some were thrown on the floor, others under and on top of the adjoining seats, whilst two persons received quite serious injury; Mrs. A. Enswiler was struck insensible, and carried to a neighboring house and cared for; she is still said to be suffering very severely. A stranger, who had been in our place for several days, and was on his way to Lancaster, had his jaw bone broken and five or six teeth driven out of his mouth. Upon the whole the escape of the passengers was indeed miraculous.

We observe by the last Manheim Sentinel, that Mr. Rosminger, the publisher, has lost an interesting son, Emanuel Baker Rosminger, in the 15th year of his age. When on a visit sometime since, to that place, we found the little fellow working a card press his father had just purchased, little thinking that in a short time we would be called upon to chronicle his death. Thus it is that "in the midst of life we are in death."
