Saturday Morning, March 31, 1886.

The Buffalo race on Friday of last week, was quite a town sensation. Two of these animals were taken from Mr. Duffy's enclosure, near his residence and put into a car to be taken to Chestnut Hill, near Philadelphia. One of them had become rather dangerous in consequence of having been teased by boys, that it was deemed advisable to remove it to a more safe place; he at once time jumped the fence of the enclosure and gave considerable trouble to the men who were watching him. When taken out on Friday he gave chase, having torn from his cap, he had first been lassoed and then extended before and behind him, to which a dozen or more men had hold, in order to guide him—and after running through the streets and alleys around the upper railroad station, roaring and bellowing frightfully, alarming nearly every person in the vicinity, until bearing the cars in which his mate had already been quietly placed, where he was "brought up" and calmly walked in.

It is with regret that we announce the death of Mr. John Sheaffer, Book-keeper of Lancaster, which took place at Lancaster on Friday of last week. His death was sudden and surprised the whole community. His health had not been good for some months, but he was able to transact his business. On Friday morning he had left home for the purpose of doing some business at Manheim, and after getting through with it started for home about five o'clock in the evening. He had not proceeded far when he was observed to be sinking and finally fell partly out of the buggy. He was at once taken out and carried to a house near by, where he died a few hours after of apoplexy. Mr. Sheaffer was widely known in Lancaster county.

The liquor cases lately heard before the U. S. Assessor for this district have been decided so far as that officer has jurisdiction. In the case of Abraham S. Hackman, of Mount Joy, the Assessor decided that there were some twenty thousand gallons of whisky sold by him on which the tax of \$2 per gallon had not been paid. For this decision Mr. Hackman appealed and the matter will undergo further investigation by the U. S. Commissioner at Washington or more likely by the U. S. Court for the Eastern district.

Capt. William E. Krater, formerly of this borough, but for the past couple of years residing in Illinois, in a recent letter to us says corn is abundant here at 15 to 25 cents a bushel; wheat at 60 cents to \$1.25; oats at 15 and 20 cents, and other kinds of market correspondingly low; he says he sold 62 gallons of molasses last year. He also says the section is healthy and is getting along finely financially and otherwise, which we are glad to learn.

Rev. Mr. Stringer, the newly appointed pastor for this borough, will preach to-morrow (Sunday) morning, at M. E. Church. Rev. Mr. Clawges will preach at the same place, on the evening, on the "offering of Isaac." Mr. Stringer was stationed at Mountjoy last year, and whilst there created quite a sensation as an able speaker.

The Spy says a flock of white geese, numbering about fifty, alighted on the Susquehanna river, opposite Columbia, on Thursday forenoon last, and remained on the stream for several hours until they were driven off by being shot from the Columbia shore. This is the first time this kind of fowl ever visited this section.
