We observe quite a number of blank walks in the borough, are in an almost impossible condition; in fact some are really dangerous, and as the promising season has arrived they should immediately be repaired. The person was searched but no money found. Lilley is said to be a respectable man at home, but indulges in occasional spree.

Rev. Sylvester Eagle, brother to Stephen F. Eagle, of this borough, pastor of the Catholic church at York, died a few days since, of dropsy.

Franklin Hipple, of this borough, went to Lancaster on Monday last, to spend "pinkster," and had his pocket picked of fifty dollars. His vest pocket, containing pocket book and money, was cut out.

We are sorry to learn of the death of Lewis Hurford Calder, of Lancaster, which took place at that city on Tuesday last. Mr. C. at one time stood in Mr. Landis' drug store, in this place, and made a great many warm friends here.

The "Youth's Temperance Society" was organized a few evenings since by the election of the following officers: President, J. Howard Cassel; Vice President, Willie E. Fleming; Secretary, Mary Redfield; Treasurer, Annie Mack; Committee of Managers: Michael Ramler, John J. Stahl, William King, Ida Schock, Clemmie Wisner, Lizzie Smith. Superintendents of the meetings: Revs. George M. Clawges, William A. Fleming and Charles F. Walters. This society has been gotten up under the auspices of Rev. Mr. Clawges, who never tires of doing good. The society meets every Saturday evening, in Temperance Hall, at 6 o'clock; the members receive a beautifully gotten up certificate of membership. A pledge of one cent a week, in the shape of dues, is required. All children are invited to attach themselves with this laudable undertaking.

Constable Emswiler brought a "colored individual" named Charles Henry, before Esquire Roath, on a charge of drunken and disorderly conduct, but as he had passed the previous night in the lock-up, and was, in consequence, sober, and making fair promises "to do no more," was let off.

The Lancaster Express says the attendance at the usual "Whit-Monday frolic" on Monday last, was quite a falling off from former years; although a number of fights and arrests took place.

Mr. Asher Bailey, for a number of years a resident of this place, died a few days since, at the residence of Prof. J. P. Wickersham, Millersville, at the advanced age of 82 years.

The morning train for Philadelphia now leaves "upper station" at twelve minutes after 8 o'clock.

The Temperance meeting on Monday evening last was addressed by Rev. J. P. Miller, of Mountjoy, and twelve names added to the list. The next meeting will take place on Monday evening the 4th day of June, which will be addressed by Rev. J. N. Crouch, G. W. C. T., of the I. O. of G. T.

Quite an amusing hearing was had before Esquire Anxer on Friday morning. A Mrs. Grande brought a charge of keeping a disorderly house against a Mrs. Clinton, living at the western end of the town. The witnesses were all females and the cross firing rich. We did not learn the up-shot of the case.

A hand-to-hand conflict took place on Front street on Friday morning, between two Israelite clothiers, all on account of a gay buxom lass at the "upper end." The interference of by-standers prevented the spilling of blood, as one of the combatants was armed with an iron bar.
