CHEAP ICE, PITCHER .- The following simple mode of keeping ice water for a long time in a common pitcher is worth knowing. We have tried it :-- Place between two sheets of paper (newspa-Earl East, . . . 4 Pequea, 3 per will answer, thick brown is better) Earl West, . . . 3 Petersburg, . . . 3 a layer of cotton batting, about half an . 3 inch in thickness; fasten the ends of the paper and batting together, forming a circle; then sew or paste a crown over one end, making a box the shape of a stovepipe hat, minus the rim.
