Prof. Wickersham, State Superntendent of Common Schools, has received during the past two months, numerous letters from prominent citizens in the States of Virginia, North Carolina, Alabama, and a still larger number from Tennessee. These letters contain minute inquiries into the character and practical workings of the Pennsylvania Common School system, with a view to excepting Tennessee, which has enacted quite a liberal and comprehensive school law, which embodies many of the best features of the Pennsylvania system. The Professor is at great pains to answer all these letters in detail, and also forwards numerous printed documents.
