Prof. Wickersham: -A very important educational measure, says the Lancaster Examiner, prepared by Prof. James Pyle Wickersham, the present State Superintendent of Common Schools, is now before the State Legislature. It has already been adopted by the House, and as it has been acted upon favorably by the Senate Committee on Education, there is little doubt of its passage by that body. The existing school laws of the State are in some respects materially changed-one of the chief reforms aimed at being an improvement in the qualifications of teachers. Prof. Wickersham says that there are now in the State, entitled to the benefits of the public school system, no less than 750,000 children. The instruction of so many growing minds is a subject that may well occupy the thoughts of the wisest of statesmen. We fully endorse the Bucks County Intelligencer in saying that as a practical and judicious leader in the field of educational progress, our State can boast of no more worthy citizen than the present head of the School Department.

DUTY OF TOWNSIHP AUDITORS.—It may not be generally known that a general law of the Legislature, approved April 11, 1866, requires the bounty occounts of every district to be carefully audited by the Township auditors, and "prepare a condensed statement of the condition of these finances, and publish the same, at the cost of the district, for three suconly requires this duty to be performed by the Township Auditors, but imposes a penalty of fifty dollars upon each Aud. itor who refuses to comply, one-half of which goes to the prosecutor, and the other half to the school fund of the district. It provides, also, that the Auditors shall notify the School Directors or other parties having the disbursement of the bounty funds, to appear before them at such a time as the Auditors shall fix, for the purpose of enabling the Auditors to close up the bounty accounts of the township for the fiscal year.
