The Morning Passenger train for Lancaster and Philadelphia will leave the upper station at 12 minutes after 8 o'clock. The train going westward will pass upper station at 7 minutes after 12 o'clock, noon. The Harrisburg accommodation train eastward will pass at 25 minutes after 6 o'clock, in the afternoon and returning arrive here at 43 minutes after 6 o'clock in the evening.
